### Inauguration

The Swearing in ceremony of H.E. Governor Mohamed Adan Khalif and H.E. Deputy Governor Dr. Ali Maalim on 25th August 2022 at Mandera stadium



Governor Khalif's first priority when he came to office was to mitigate on drought, seek national government support and humanitarian actors to come on board on and cushion the community from the impact of the prolonged drought

**PRESS STATEMENT BY H.E. MOHAMED ADAN KHALIF, THE GOVERNOR OF MANDERA COUNTY, ON DROUGHT ISSUED ON SUNDAY 23RD SEPTEMBER 2022.**

1. The drought situation is growing from bad to worse due to global climate change, resulting in four consecutive failed rainy seasons since 2020. Furthermore, the World Meteorological Organization has predicted that the fifth rainy season is also likely to fail. This is a life-threatening prediction for pastoralist communities and their livelihood. The number of people in need of humanitarian assistance is 500,000; this translates to half of Mandera County's population. Therefore, I appeal to His Excellency President William Ruto to declare the drought a national disaster;

2. As county government, we are already working on emergency response through water trucking and food aid for vulnerable

households in conjunction with National Drought Management Authority and donors;

3. We currently supply 1.8 million liters of water to 192 villages daily. The drought is approaching its peak in mid-October, and we will require up to 4 million liters of water daily to save people and livestock over the next 30 days.

Therefore, we need at least Ksh.75 million for water trucking, fuel subsidy, borehole repairs and maintenance. It will also allow us to set up a rapid response team to fix borehole breakdowns and facilitate emergency response;

4. There are currently about 80,000 households who are receiving cash transfers from various donors and NDMA (National

Drought Management Authority). This, however, does not cover all vulnerable families.

An estimated 22,000 additional households need cash transfers for the next three months. To protect these families from the adverse effects of climate change, we need Ksh 1.2 billion;

5. Despite our concerted efforts, Mandera is still experiencing acute water shortage, food insecurity, malnutrition, limited pastures and reduced livestock prices. Moreover, the high demand for livestock feeds, with 50kg of cereals going for Kshs.4,500-5,000, has pushed food prices higher.

We, therefore, ask the National government and the international community to come to our aid;



6. Mander residents are primarily pastoralists, and they are losing a considerable number of their livestock due to starvation and drought-related diseases. The high livestock mortality rate is making the food insecurity challenge more severe. The cumulative livestock deaths in September across all the species stand at: 365,283 Cattle [160,721 Camels]495,169 shoats] and 29,314 donkeys from January 2022 to date;

7. The estimated number of livestock currently in urgent need of supplementary feeds, treatment and water across the county are: Cattle 452,724 (60% of the total population), Camel 386,448(40% of the total population), Goats 1,365,841 (40% of the total population), Sheep 333,260 (40% of the total population) and Donkeys 105,660 (60% of the total population);

8. Drought has also affected our education sector as hungry students cannot concentrate in schools. Moreover, schools will re-

open when drought is at its peak, which calls for urgent contingency measures, including water supply to schools and complementing the food supply to 41 boarding schools and the 312 ECDE centers in our county. We need an estimated 370 million for this intervention;

9. Food insecurity has resulted in drought-related diseases affecting the pastoralists and their livelihoods. Due to a decline in milk production, reduced milk consumption, poor dietary diversity and reduced food intake, 29% (108,735) of children under five years in Mander face acute malnutrition. In addition, 4% and 33% of households scored poor or borderline food consumption scores, respectively. In addition, only 13.5% of the women ate healthily. Another 15,216 estimated caseloads of pregnant and lactating women require treatment;

10. My humble request to His Excellency the President is to initiate the following

measures to save lives and livelihoods; livestock off-take program by KMC (Kenya Meat Commission), releasing grains from the strategic food reserves, monitoring of food supply and urging private sectors not to take advantage of the current situation by inflating cost of food commodities;

11. We are ready to work with the national government to eradicate food insecurity, reduce the cost of living and hunger-related deaths of our people, their livestock and wild animals. This collaboration will ensure that, moving forward, no Kenyan citizen will die from hunger and starvation;

12. Finally, I wish to pass our sincere thanks to partners who have been supporting us with interventions: NDMA, Racida, Islamic Relief, World Vision, DRC, Kenya Red Cross society, Napad, Care international and save the children. We appeal to them to scale up support to help our people cope with famine.


**Livestock Feed**

ACHIEVEMENTS: DEPARTMENT OF WATER SERVICES



**Coordination of Water Sector Efforts**

There has been marked improvement in the coordination of water sector efforts both at WESCOORD and CSG due to the special interest shown by H.E. the Governor in chairing CSG meetings. This has increased the number of CSG and WESCOORD meeting held during the 100 days of these administration which has increased support received from partners Agencies over the period.

**Water Trucking Services**

The county Government of Mandera in collaboration with other Development Partners including NDMA, RACIDA, ISLAMIC RELIEF-K, Action against Hunger, Save the Children and Alite together undertook water trucking to 250 centres County wide. These water trucking efforts targeted both human and livestock populations in areas where seasonal water sources had dried up and livestock camps within pasture reserves. Approximately 232,000 people and their livestock benefitted from these water trucking services.



**Drilling of Emergency Boreholes**

In the 1<sup>st</sup> 100 days, the County Government drilled 3 emergency Boreholes at El-ram, Birkan, Errestino and Kiliwehiri. Birkan and kiliwehiri Boreholes which yield 10M3/hr and 8M3/hr respectively have both been equipped and are fully operational serving an estimated combined population of about 16,256 people and their livestock.

During the same period the Department of Water Services with the support of UNICEF repaired 75 Boreholes which were broken down within the period under re-view.

This brought the No of broken down Boreholes in the County down from 34 in August 2022 to only 1 presently.



**Repair of Boreholes**

A total population of 203,000 peoples, 69 schools and 57 health facilities benefitted from the restoration of water supplies following these repairs.

Seventy five Boreholes repaired, thirty nine submersible motors replaced, 1060 draw pipes replaced in twenty three Boreholes, thirteen submersible pumps and 3,250m of submersible cables were also replaced.



sets were provided for Bulla Haji, Orgay, Kiliwehiri and Borehole 11. DRC also provided new Gen-sets for Harbate and Damasa Boreholes while the County Government provided a new Gen-set for Wardadud Borehole. RACIDA has procured 8 new Gen-sets and nine submersible pump-sets for Fino, Waranqara, Hullow, Malkamari, Shimbir Fatuma, Kob Adadi west, Lan Qurac, Harsanga and Deg Marer. These equipment was handed over to the County Department of Water Services on 29th of November 2022.

**Rehabilitation of Water supplies**

With the support of UNICEF, the County Department of water services has completed the rehabilitation of six rural water supply facilities and one school WASH project County-wide. These include; Neboi, Bur Abor, Yabicho, 100m<sup>3</sup> elevated steel tank at Rhamu water supply, 40m<sup>3</sup> elevated steel tank at Elele and 50m<sup>3</sup> elevated steel tank at Falama and Mandera school for the Blind. These efforts together benefitted a total population of 45,113 people. In addition, two proposals amounting to Kshs 14,490,000 have been approved for funding by UNICEF for the rehabilitation of Affalo, Bur Abor and Wachile Rural water supplies, improvement of Degmarer and Al-Hidaya shool WASH facilities.

managed to repair 70 Borehole breakdowns and equipped 9 Boreholes. We are therefore delighted to report that all our infiltration Gallery wells and Boreholes in the County are now operational except Bulla Haji IGW whose spare part is awaited from UNICEF.

**Development of a County Ground Water Inventory**

Under the Horn of Africa Ground Water for Resilience Project, the Department supported a consultant hired to develop a county Ground Water Inventory. During the period under review the training of field data collectors and visit to all Boreholes to collect data was completed and the consultant is presently compiling and analyzing these data.

The County Sub-PIU has developed a one year work plan for the projects which will be submitted to PIU for review, approval and support.

**Takaba Water Supply Master Plan**

In the last three months, a consultant hired by UNICEF, Tertiary Consulting Engineers, concluded, the formulation of a twenty five years water master plan for Takaba town and its environs, Development preliminary designs & costings and Proposed Management model for the proposed urban water supply scheme. The outputs of the study has been finalized and is ready to be launched in Takaba town early next month.

**Aquifer Mapping**

UNICEF has also been supporting the County Government in carrying satellite supported ground water mapping. So far the preliminary findings of the process show promising results but the final outputs of the exercise will be shared early next year.

**Desilting of Earth pans**

The county department of water services has constructed 60,000m<sup>3</sup> Earth pans in Alungu and kosaye. With the support of development partners (NDMA & ISLAMIC RELIEF ) the department of water services has also constructed 20,000m<sup>3</sup> Earth pan in kubi and desilted 30,000m<sup>3</sup> Alungu Earth pan during the period under review.

**Equipping of Boreholes**

With support from UNICEF, Garbaab and Degmarer Boreholes were fully equipped while New Gen-

The County Department of Water Services has established three Rapid Response Maintenance Teams that are on duty 24/7 to attend to any reported breakdowns county wide. The three teams comprise of sixteen officers among them are four plumbers, three electricians, three drivers, three Mechanics and three Engineering Assistants. During the period of the last 100 days the teams

### Meeting with Drivers/transport department


H.E. Mohamed Adan Khalif held an open meeting with the transport department to discuss ways to improve county government transport and vehicle maintenance for better service delivery.

### Unicef

Governor Khalif held met with Mr Mahboob Ahmed Bajwa, WASH Chief and current Deputy Country Representative, UNICEF Kenya at Windsor Hotel in Nairobi where they discussed the current drought emergencies and UNICEF's ongoing and planned support for Mandera county.



**Borehole Equipment**

Borehole 11 community received a new Genset Courtesy of UNICEF Kenya, as part of the drought mitigation measures. 30 KVA Perkins Genset to Wargadud to respond to severe drought. This is line with my promise to Wargadud residents during the campaign. In Sha Allah we shall respond to other centres experiencing similar challenges.



**NDMA meeting**

Governor Khalif held an in-depth meeting with National Drought Monitoring Authority (NDMA) officials with a view to fast tracking interventions to cushion Mandera residents from the devastating drought.



**Turkish Cooperation & Coordination Agency (TIKA)**

Governor Khalif visited the Turkish Cooperation & Coordination Agency (TIKA) office in Nairobi where he met with the agency's Nairobi Coordinator, Mr Eyup Yavuz to discuss current ravaging drought situation in our Mandera and explore long-term solutions in addressing cyclic drought amongst other matters.



### County Assembly opening

Mandera County Governor Mohamed Adan Khalif officially opened the 3rd County assembly of Mandera. He exhibited positive collaboration between the county assembly and the executive. He challenged the leaders to join hands and embark on service.



### CIDP Public Participation on CIDP 2023-2027

The implementation of the second generation CIDP2018-2022 is coming to an end in FY 2022/23. The department of Economic Planning led by Chief Officer Fartun Bulle and her team implored the guidelines developed by National Treasury is coming up with the Third generation CIDP 2023/27 where bottom up approach of data collection has been done with Mandera residents. Public participation was conducted in 464 villages where their most pressing needs were taken into account. The draft document is now validated by sectors and government entities awaiting first publishing for review.



### Vulnerable Mapping, Relief food flag off & distribution

Governor Khalif flagged off 750 metric tons of foodstuff and 180,000 litres of cooking oil. This intervention will cover about 60,000 Vulnerable House Holds and People living with disability. Other beneficiaries are boarding secondary schools, special needs schools and registered orphanage.



### World Bank, Water Resource Authority

Governor Mohamed Adan Khalif held a meeting with representatives from World Bank, Water Resources Authority, Water Sector Trust Fund and Ministry of Water to deliberate on matters of effects of climate change and course of action in management of ground water resource, assessment and performance of the existing water facilities, identifying prime areas to carry out experimental boreholes and testing of its sustainability.



**CECMs oath taking**

Governor Khalif witnessed the Oath taking ceremony of the recently appointed County Executive Committee Members for ten ministries, County Secretary & Head of Public Service and County Attorney.



**Education taskforce**

Governor Khalif has formed a taskforce to review and propose reforms in the county Early Childhood Development, Technical and Vocational Education and Training. This is the second taskforce that will look into the problems facing the education sector and is expected to present its recommendation within 90 days. Governor Khalif intimated that his government will implement the recommendation from the taskforce. Presidential working party on Education taskforce held public participation at Mander Secondary school. The terms of reference are on basic education to undertake summative evaluation and assessment.



**Health taskforce visit**

Health Reform Task Force has been mandated to collect adequate information from health department in identifying areas of success, challenges and possible gaps for quality public healthcare services.



### Turkey Visit

Mandera County Governor Mohamed Adan Khalif and his team visited Turkey to seek short and long-term support for Mandera residents in drought mitigation. In addition to prudent use of the currently available resources to deal with development prerequisites. He necessitated the need to seek aid from friends both within our borders and beyond.

On dealing with water shortages, he said plans are underway to supply water drilling equipment and pumps in worst hit areas.
